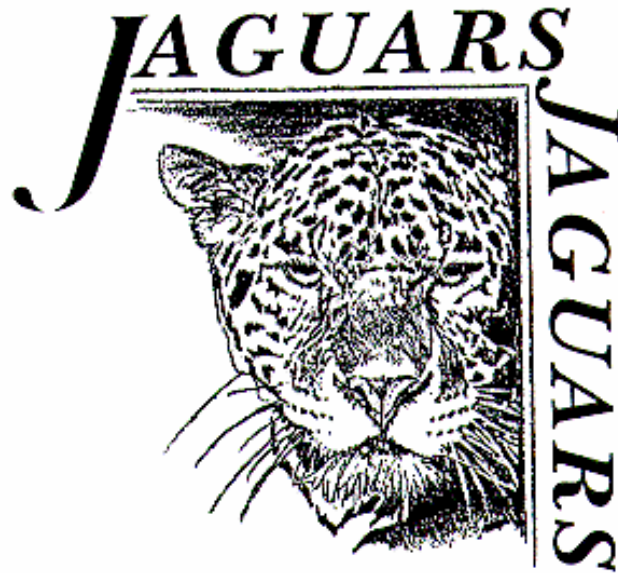

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN . . .

PRE-AP / HONORS WORLD GEOGRAPHY AND REGULAR



	PRE-AP / HONORS	REGULAR
PACE OF CLASS	Faster, more in depth on each region	Normal Pace
OUTSIDE WORK	Students will have homework each night as well as short and long-term projects throughout the year. Students should also read or watch the news on a regular basis for classroom discussions.	Students will have reading and writing activities as well as map work.
PROJECTS	Students will be assigned short and long term projects that will be completed individually and in a group. Some projects will involve class presentations.	Students will complete 2 or 3 long-term projects each semester.

WHAT IS . . .

AP WORLD HISTORY



PACE OF CLASS

This AP class moves extremely fast. Students will cover an average of 30 pages every week. The majority of the work in this class is student driven, so students electing to take this class will need to be self motivated and willing to work hard.

OUTSIDE WORK

Students are responsible for textbook reading and note taking on a daily basis. Assignments are given at the beginning of the semester in calendar form, and students independently monitor their own work load. Chapter quizzes and unit tests (3 per semester) help monitor student progress.

PROJECTS

Current fall semester project pertains to major world religions and middle ages around the world. Spring semester projects rotate on a yearly basis. In addition, students are required to complete an outside reading project each semester, one over a non-fiction historical book and the other a historical fiction novel. These are read entirely outside of class.

WRITING SKILLS

The students that are most successful in this course possess strong critical reading and writing skills. All tests have essays, and the writing portions are 50% of all test grades.

OVERALL EXPECTATIONS

Students should have a strong desire for a very broad, yet in-depth study of the major developments in Human History. Analytical skill to evaluate the interaction between various global systems will be developed. Strong writing skills to demonstrate the higher order thinking skills are required in AP courses. Much more than just names and dates, AP World History is a very in-depth study of not just the political changes over time, but also the cultural, social and economic changes that have also occurred.

WHAT IS . . .

AP HUMAN GEOGRAPHY



PACE OF CLASS

This AP class moves extremely fast. The majority of the work in this class revolves around chapter readings in the two textbooks, so students electing to take this class will need to be self motivated and willing to work hard.

OUTSIDE WORK

Homework includes assigned readings and project work.

PROJECTS

Usually one per unit. Most projects are done in a group situation with 3 to 4 students per group. Students must be able to work in a social setting.

WRITING SKILLS

The students that are most successful in this course possess strong critical reading and writing skills. All tests have essays, and there are three to four essays on the College Board AP Exam.

WEIGHTING OF GRADES

Tests & projects: 75%
Daily: 25%

OVERALL EXPECTATIONS

To prepare students to pass and excel on the College Board AP Exam which requires a critical analysis of world cultures.

WHAT IS . . .

AP EUROPEAN HISTORY



PACE OF CLASS

This AP class moves extremely fast. The majority of the work in this class revolves around readings from two sources. Students will use a textbook and as well as a document reader to supplement the textbook. Students electing to take this class will need to be self motivated and willing to work hard.

OUTSIDE WORK

Homework includes assigned readings and project work.

PROJECTS

Usually one per unit. Most projects are done in a group situation with 3 to 4 students per group. Students must be able to work in a social setting.

WRITING SKILLS

The students that are most successful in this course possess strong critical reading and writing skills. All tests have essays, and there are three to four essays on the College Board AP Exam.

WEIGHTING OF GRADES

Tests & projects: 75%
Daily: 25%

OVERALL EXPECTATIONS

Unlike other AP offerings at Jasper, A.P. European History is an elective credit. Due to this feature as well as the in depth nature of the course, students enrolling in this course should possess a strong love of history and its study. Our goal is to prepare students to pass and excel on the College Board AP Exam which requires a critical analysis of European history.

PACE OF CLASS

A fast paced, rigorous curriculum! English I Pre-AP is a student-sustained class, so students must be able to read novels outside of class and keep a fast pace of reading and understanding.

Taught on 9th Grade level as a prep class for junior colleges and 4-year colleges. A course syllabus by unit including reading, reflective writing and literary analysis.

OUTSIDE WORK

There is a significant amount of required reading (both inside and outside of class)! Required reading: selected short stories and poetry; *The Odyssey* (full work); *Life Of Pi* (full work); *The Pearl*; *Romeo and Juliet*; *21 Great Stories*

Required reading: selected short stories and poetry, *The Odyssey* (from text book) and *Romeo and Juliet* and one additional nonfiction work.

PROJECTS

Several Culmination Assessment Projects (CAP) throughout the year.

WRITING SKILLS

Students will have assigned research projects to promote research and presentation skills. Grammar skills are taught within the context of writing and literature. Students learn the inclusion of textual evidence in writing using paraphrase, summary and direct quotation. Students will also build a portfolio of written work and complete timed essays in class.

Students build a portfolio of written work. Grammar skills are taught separately and within the context of writing and literature. Students learn the inclusion of textual evidence in writing using quotes, paraphrase, and summary. Reflective writing and literary analysis are emphasized. A mini-research assignment is completed sometime during the year.

PACE OF CLASS

A fast paced, rigorous curriculum! English II Pre-AP is a student-sustained class, so students must be able to read novels outside of class and keep a fast pace of reading and understanding.

High school, sophomore level curriculum. Daily or weekly syllabus for class work and homework.

OUTSIDE WORK

Students will receive a syllabus for each unit.

A significant amount of reading requirements (both inside and outside of class)!

Students will be assigned two novels and one non-fiction work throughout the year.

PROJECTS

Build a writing portfolio and complete two AP critical analysis papers and two research papers.

Build a writing portfolio and complete one research paper.

WRITING SKILLS

Students must possess above-level writing skills.

Students will learn about the processes of writing and practice them in and out of class.

WEIGHTING OF GRADES

OVERALL EXPECTATIONS

Students must be able to keep up with a rigorous and fast paced college prep curriculum, both in and out of class. The Pre-AP mandate is to prepare students for AP level English courses at the senior high level. 25% of the semester final exam is a writing assessment.

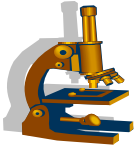

	PRE-AP / HONORS	REGULAR
PACE OF CLASS	Initial concepts are given less time while enrichment and extension of concepts are given extra time.	Normal pace with coverage of basic concepts.
OUTSIDE WORK	30 minutes of homework each night.	30 minutes of homework each night.
PROJECTS	Usually 1 or 2 per semester.	Possibly 1 per semester.
Assessment Expectations	Occasional non-routine problems containing multiple concepts, requiring application of prior skills to new situations.	Generally review all skill applications and have few non-routine problems.
RECOMMENDED BACKGROUND	Honors Algebra 1 and Honors Geometry with an average of 80 or higher.	Honors or regular Algebra 1 and honors or regular Geometry.

PACE OF CLASS	Very fast and in depth.	Survey course that covers concepts with less depth than Pre-AP/Honors.
OUTSIDE WORK	In addition to 40 minutes of homework nightly, numerous reading assignments and lab write-ups.	30 minutes of homework each night.
PROJECTS	one research project	N / A
WRITING SKILLS	Above-level writing skills Strong Self-Initiative	On-level writing skills

	PRE-AP / HONORS	REGULAR
PACE OF CLASS	Traditional chemistry that is very fast paced – covers more in depth material.	Traditional chemistry with material less in depth than Honors/Pre-AP.
OUTSIDE WORK	15 – 20 minutes of written homework each night plus reading and studying.	At least 15 minutes of written work each night.
PROJECTS	Performance task, one formal lab write-up per semester and one research project.	Performance task and one small project per semester.
WRITING SKILLS	Must be able to write well and write chemical lab abstracts.	Must be able to write well.
RECOMMENDED BACKGROUND	Honors Biology 1 Regular biology with teacher recommendation from Algebra 1 Strong Self-Initiative; Self-disciplined.
